





NUNAVIK FUND FOR ARTS & LITERATURE

Simplified Information - January 28, 2009

INTRODUCTION

- In January 2009, Avataq Cultural Institute, Kativik Regional Government (KRG) and the Conseil des arts et des lettres du Québec (CALQ) signed a special agreement spanning three years (2008-2011) to create the **Nunavik Fund for Arts and Literature**.
- The Nunavik Fund has two components specifically for Inuit artists from the region of Nunavik:

Component I: Assistance for Professional Artists & Writers Component II: Artist and Writer's Residency in Montreal

- The objectives of the Nunavik Fund are:
 - foster **partnerships** between artists/writers and their communities
 - foster mentorship between established artist/writers and emerging artist/writers
 - foster **recognition** of artists/writers in their communities and in the region
 - establish a **residency** in Montreal for artists to pursue research and creation

ELIGIBILITY

- To be eligible to apply to either of the two components, candidates must be a **professional artist**. This means anyone who
 - calls themselves an artist
 - makes artwork for their own behalf (eg not as an employee)
 - earns money from their art or creative services
 - has presented their work in **public** (eg at a school, local concert, gallery, museum, local NV offices, on radio or television, etc)
 - is recognized by their peers as an artist (eg by other artists in the community or region, through an award, scholarship or contest)
 - is a member of an artist association
- Candidates must also be an Inuit beneficiary of the JBNQA or an Inuk from Nunavik.
- They must have been a **resident of Québec** during the 12 months before the application deadline.
- An emerging artist/writer is one at the beginning of their career, and must be aged 35 years old or younger at the date of application.
- To be considered a **group or collective of artists/writers**, each member of the group must be a **professional** or **emerging** artist as defined above. One member of the group should be named the **coordinator.**

• Incorporated groups (whether non-profit or for profit) cannot make an application to the Nunavik Fund.

RESTRICTIONS

- An artist who has already received **funding from the Nunavik Fund** can make another application **only if** they have submitted a **final report** on the use of the grant, and it has been accepted by Avataq.
- An artist who has received a **grant under another CALQ programme** can make an application to the Nunavik Fund **only if** they have submitted a **final report** (or a **progress report** if the project has not yet be completed) and the report has been accepted by CALQ.
- An artist **may not submit more than one project** to the Nunavik Fund, either individually or as a group, per deadline.
- If the project has already been finished by the application deadline, it is not eligible.

TYPES OF ELIGIBLE PROJECTS

Projects for **Component I** must involve some kind of **partnership**, for example:

- creation/exhibition projects leading to an artist's **first professional public exposure** (exhibition, performance, publication, screening, etc)
- exhibition projects featuring a **collaboration between artists and the community** (with organizations such as schools, libraries, NVs, landholdings, community groups, etc)
- for an **emerging artist**, this could be a sponsorship or **mentorship** project with a **regionally recognized artist** or **professional organization**

Partnerships can involve a **financial contribution** (money) or an **in-kind contribution** (donated space, expertise, materials, equipment, etc).

Projects for **Component II** involve **two months in Montreal** to carry out research or artistic creation. The plan for the two months is up to the artist/writer to decide. For example, the time in Montreal could be used to:

- take an art course or learn a new technique
- visit galleries and museums for artistic inspiration
- write a book or manuscript
- research a topic for an art project
- simply make art in a new setting

INELIGIBLE PROJECTS

- projects already receiving funding from the **Québec Minister of Culture and Communications** (including SODEC and CALQ)
- projects carried out as part of a university undergraduate program

projects aimed at starting a business or workshop strictly for commercial purposes.

MAXIMUM AMOUNT OF GRANT

Component I: Assistance for Professional Artists and Writers

- for an individual artist/writer, the maximum grant amount is \$10,000
- for a group or collective, the maximum grant amount is \$15,000
- the amount of the grant can cover 95% of expenses
- this means at least **5**% of funding should come from another source (KRG, NV, Landholding, Makivik, Canada Council for the Arts, local school, community organization, etc)
- remember this can be a contribution of either money or donated services/materials
- for **individual projects**, the 5% contribution from another source would be worth approximately **\$525** (if you asked for the maximum for the Nunavik Fund)
- for **group projects**, the 5% contribution from another source would be worth approximately **\$790**

Component II: Artist and Writer's Residency in Montreal

• the amount of the grant is **\$10,000** and covers **100%** of the following costs: airfare, insurance, per diem, and the purchase of materials for the project. An apartment in central Montreal is provided free of charge.

INADMISSIBLE EXPENSES

The grant from the Nunavik Fund cannot be used to pay for the following things:

- operating costs (administrative costs, salaries) of organizations involved in the project
- expenses related to fundraising, financing, marketing campaigns
- infrastructure expenses (installation of telephone line, office rental, etc)
- **buying equipment** like a computer, video camera (unless it is necessary to the project and cannot be reused)
- renovation or construction costs

EVALUATION CRITERIA

- · does the project meet the programme objectives?
- artistic value of the project
- impact on the artist's career development
- impact and long-term effects in the community
- how much of the budget is paid to artists?
- is the budget realistic?
- is the timeline/workplan realistic?
- does the applicant have the ability to carry out the project?

SELECTION

- Submitted projects will be evaluated by a **jury** (selection committee) made up of **resource people from the arts/literature world.**
- They must have knowledge of the arts in Nunavik
- Avatag/CALQ will ensure that the committee includes Inuit artists

HOW TO MAKE AN APPLICATION

- 1. fill out the application form
- 2. **describe the project** for which funding is requested (maximum of 500 words or 2 pages)
- for Component I, fill out the budget form with all expenses (the things you will need to pay for) and revenues (all the sources of funding or services) (NOTE: no budget is required for Component II, the residency in Montreal)
- 4. include **letters** from the other partners involved in the project
- 5. Make a **timetable** for the project: when will you start? when will you finish? what are the major steps from beginning to end?
- 6. Include a **portfolio** or **samples of your work**, depending on the area of the arts you are working in.

DEADLINE

- Monday, March 16, 2009
- You must **mail** your application by this date (it must have the postmark from the post-office)
